



Our 'Sponsor a Chair' Campaign

When I was Chaplain at New College, Oxford, we regularly used – as they still do – a remarkable seventeenth-century prayer. It spoke, even in those turbulent times, of making God's House open to all in need of love and fellowship. How best to do this will change with the passing decades and centuries, though there can be no debate about the **priority** of being open and available to all.

Thus, it has now been finally decided that the Cathedral will open up its interior for events other than services, like cathedrals all over the country, encouraging people to visit and experience this wonderful space which so often feels like Newport's best-kept secret.

Fundamental to this will be the replacement of the 20th-century pews by 21st-century chairs, thus making the place both flexible and comfortable.

The pews will be available for purchase by those who would like one. This will help us raise some of the cost of repairing the scars left by the pews, and also to help toward the considerable cost of the fine, new chairs.

The chairs are the same as those chosen by almost every cathedral that has made this change, including St Paul's, Gloucester, Worcester, Canterbury and St Davids. They will greatly

enhance the Cathedral's appearance, as well as making the main space ('nave') more flexible.

The Cathedral doesn't belong to the Sunday congregation though they often bear the burden of its maintenance and improvement. So, in common with every cathedral that has recently made this change, we hope that some of the cost will come from sponsorship by people who perhaps don't worship with us but who value the idea of making the

Cathedral more comfortable to experience and more available to be enjoyed. You might wish to sponsor a chair in memory of someone or in thanksgiving for something. Whatever the reason, we would be most grateful to you for helping us to make the Cathedral open to the city and to the diocese, to the present and to the future.

Gift Direct scheme

Recent music events at St Woolos:

Barely eight months into her post here as Director of Music, Emma Gibbins has been busy promoting the work of the choir, finding new members, starting a Voluntary Choir to fill in on occasions, and generally broadening the scope of music activities. In July we listened, spellbound, as she gave a recital on the Cathedral Organ and showed what a versatile instrument it is, especially in such skilled hands. Record numbers attended the recital, one of the regular events organised by Music@St Woolos.

A week later, she hosted a Royal College of Church Music Festival in the Cathedral, bringing in a large number of singers from parishes all over the Diocese, and probably beyond, to rehearse a variety of hymns and anthems, with a Festival Service to round off the day.

ARCHITECTURE CORNER

Tucked away at the East end of the North Aisle, opposite the door leading to the downstairs rooms, is a large brass wall plaque in memory of Octavius Morgan. It reads:

“In memory of Charles Octavius Swinnerton Morgan of the Friars of this parish, fourth son of Sir Charles Morgan, second Baronet of Tredegar, born at Ealing, 15th September 1803, educated at Westminster School and at Christchurch, Oxford where he graduated M.A. in 1826. A fellow of the Royal Society, and of the Society of Antiquaries, a Justice of the Peace, and a Deputy Lieutenant of this county. He served in Parliament for this county from February 1841 to January 1874. He died at The Friars 5th August 1888 and was buried in the Tredegar vault at Bassaleg.”



Octavius Morgan is best remembered for his huge energy, enthusiasm and expertise in many aspects of antiquarianism in Gwent, but especially for his endeavours in excavation and preservation of Roman Caerleon and Caerwent. He was a founding member of the Monmouthshire & Caerleon Antiquarian Association, and played a major role in the setting up of the “Museum of Antiquities” at Caerleon (now know as the National Roman Legion Museum, owned by the National Museum Wales). He wrote many books, pamphlets and articles in archaeological journals regarding the castles, ancient

houses and ecclesiastical buildings of Gwent; he also had a great interest in ancient watches, astronomical instruments and church plate and the hallmarking of gold and silver. Some valuable items from his extensive personal collection were left, on his death, to the British Museum, and can still be seen there. His papers, drawings and correspondence are in the National Museum of Wales.

Adjacent to his plaque memorial is a stained glass window containing the arms of the Morgan family, of Tredegar Park. On either side can be seen the arms of the sees of Gloucester and Llandaff, both of which, in different periods, had the gift of the living of St. Woolos.
